KCSIE updates and FREE webinar

The latest update to the <u>Keeping Children</u>
<u>Safe in Education guidance has been</u>
<u>published by the Department for Education</u>,
outlining new changes and requirements for schools as part of their safeguarding duties.

There are some new recommendations and expectations on schools worth being aware of before the guidance comes into force in September. These include:

- Informing job applicants about online searches
- Online filtering and monitoring software used by schools
- Clarification on allegations against outside organisations and individuals using school premises
- Confirmation on DBS documents

England Fourth in Reading Rankings

In May 2023, the Progress in International Reading Literacy Study* (PIRLS) results were published in which England was ranked fourth out of the 43 countries assessed. The test assessed reading ability of the 9–10-year-old cohort and is considered to be a benchmark for literacy competency internationally.

The Prime Minister, Rishi Sunak, said 'driving up literacy rates is central to our plan to grow the economy, one of my 5 key priorities, so it's great to see England move up to fourth in the international rankings for reading.' The True Cost of School

In their May 2023 report, Child Poverty Action Group* (CPAG) reported on the true cost to families of sending children to school in the UK. Whilst many children and young people are fortunate to access free top quality schools, the associated payments required of families is often significant.

In their report, CPAG state:

'Researchers have found that going to school in the UK costs families of primary school children at least £864.87 a year, or £18.69 a week. This is before childcare costs are accounted for. For families of secondary school children, the cost of sending a child to school is at least £1,755.97 a year. This is £39.01 a week. This means the total cost of meeting a child's minimum educational needs across all 14 years of school (primary and secondary but excluding household costs such as laptops) is £18,345.85. This can be broken down as £6,054.09 for seven years at primary school and £12,291.76 for seven years at secondary school.'

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School uniform, meals and trips are cited as being some of the most expensive associated costs of sending children to school. At a time when many families are already struggling with the rising cost of living, ensuring all children and young people can access a rich and fulfilling education is stretching both school and parents' budgets.

In his recent writing in SecEd*, Sean Harris explores how schools can respond to the impact of disadvantage within their communities through using a model of 3 Cs – classroom, culture and children. The article outlines how schools can consider how best to address social inequality and support the most vulnerable by:

- ensuring purposeful and high-quality delivery of education in the classroom
- nurturing a culture of openness and transparency to genuinely understand the community
- actively listening to what children are saying about their experience of poverty, and delivering lessons to help them make sense of what is happening.

Magic Breakfast Success

Magic Breakfast* explain how they work to 'ensure that no child in our partner schools is too hungry to learn by providing healthy breakfast food and expert support to help identify and reach those pupils at risk of hunger. A hungry child cannot concentrate so could miss out on half a day of lessons every school day if not given anything nutritious to eat first thing.'



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We are delighted to have raised money for over 50,000 breakfasts towards our 1 million breakfasts for children and young people in primary, secondary, and special schools nationwide. From taking part in The Great Big Breakfast, to running the London Marathon and hiking mountains, the Connex Team has smashed our target and have been delighted to hear about how the funds are already ensuring full tummies set for great learning in schools

External Defibrillator Eligibility

Primary, secondary and alternative provision schools in areas of high levels of deprivation may be eligible to receive a fully funded defibrillator for their school and community. The list (published on 3rd May 2023) of eligible schools, can be found here. Public access defibrillators are literally a community lifeline which we are sure your neighbours would greatly appreciate.

Sowing Seeds for the National Education Nature Park

Primary schools nationwide received a free packet of wildflower seeds as part of the celebrations for the King's Coronation. This is only one part of a new and exciting partnership between the Department for Education, the National History Museum* and The Eden Project* who have joined forces to create the National Education Nature Park.



'The National Education Nature Park will be a network of outdoor spaces in education settings across England, managed by young people.

Young people will lead the way in mapping, monitoring and enhancing their learning sites for nature - boosting biodiversity, equipping them with green and digital skills, and enhancing their wellbeing through an increased connection to the environment.'

Schools can register their interest to be part of the scheme here and can access free outdoor learning idea resources from Learning through Landscape* here.

The National Education Nature Park is part of the Department for Education's desire to improve access to outdoor learning spaces and nature for children and young people living in the areas with the least access to natural spaces. A £15 million funding boost has been ring fenced to support projects including the Nature Park.

Expanding Attendance Hubs

Following a successful pilot of the Attendance Hubs model, the Department for Education recently announced nine schools and academy trusts who will form a wider network of regional attendance support. 600 schools are set to receive support as part of the expansion of the Hubs programme, in addition to the growth of an attendance monitoring programme currently being piloted in the North East.



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Many schools have struggled to improve student attendance since the Covid-19 pandemic, and much is still to do to support the most prolific absentees to reengage with education. We are sure that topics around attendance will continue to hit the headlines in the new academic year and remain committed to supporting schools to support students in making academic and social progress through providing top quality tutors and tuition.
