Keeping Children Safe in Education 2023

Schools will be aware of the changes made to the <u>Keeping Children Safe in Education</u> statutory guidance for schools and colleges which came into effect on Friday 1st September 2023. A summary of edits from previous versions can be found on page 176.

Improving your School's Wifi Connection

If your school is located in an 'education investment area' (see the list <u>here</u>), you may be eligible for support to improve your onsite internet speed. Schools should have been contacted if they have been identified as being priority for the Connect the Classroom initiative* which runs until 2025. Increasing Number of EHC and SEND Plans in English Schools

The number of Education Health and Care Plans (EHCPs) in English schools has risen by 7% from the same time last year. Over 4,000 new plans have been instated for those children and young people in need of additional and specific care in their educational setting. In addition, pupils entitled to SEN support without an EHCP has increased by 4.7% from 2022. The headline facts and figures for SEND statistics can be viewed <u>here.</u>

Youth Unemployment Improved by Extra-Curricular Engagement

In a recent report published by Demos* in association with Scouts*, youth unemployment in the UK was noted as being a significant concern both socially and economically.



According to their research, 'the UK is facing a significant youth unemployment challenge that is detrimental to the economy, society and the lives of young people. In the first quarter of 2023, the youth unemployment rate was 10.8%, considerably higher than the rate for all UK adults at 3.7%. The cost of youth unemployment to the UK economy over the next decade has been estimated at £28 billion. The costs to young people themselves are just as dire – exposure to youth unemployment can have a life-long impact on an individual's earnings and mental health.'

A double whammy lack of both technical and transferrable skills is cited as being one of the main concerns of employers who are finding it difficult to recruit appropriately skilled young people into the workforce. Transferable skills such as leadership, teamwork and communication are noted as being of particular interest given that these are often not taught explicitly through the formal curriculum. Key recommendations from the report centre around the need for a wide breadth of extracurricular opportunities for children and young people at all ages. The Scouts are mentioned as being a strong example of ways for pupils to expand their horizons and develop skills vital for a successful adulthood. Bite Back 2030 – Breaking the Association Between Sport and Junk Food

Bite Back 2030* are a charity raising awareness of how food and drink companies are targeting young people with adverts for unhealthy consumables through sports, particularly football. Their 2022 research found that young people associated brands such as Lucozade, Pepsi, Walkers and McDonald's with football. They found that sports-based marketing had a significant impact on the target audience. Bite Back 2030 are backing a movement for change, empowering young people to understand the facts and make them aware of the marketing ploys enlisted to target them.



The School Food Champions programme for Key Stage 3 is a particularly interesting initiative designed to bolster schools' existing approaches to promoting health and wellbeing. Whist applications for the 2023/24 cohort are now closed, it will be worth keeping an eye out for the next cohort applications. Attendance Matters

Alarming statistics published last month suggest that persistent absence rates (those pupils missing more than 10% of school) is currently 22.3%. With absenteeism being worse in secondary schools (28.3%) than primary schools (17.2%). It is well reported that schools have struggled to improve pupil attendance to pre-pandemic level, and a combination of factors in the 2022-23 academic year made supporting the improvement of attendance particularly challenging for many education settings.



Whilst there is no 'one size fits all' approach to tackling school absence, you may find Dr Pooky Knightsmith's* article recently published in SecEd* thought-provoking as you plan for how to positively engage with those families who are often hard to reach. Access the article **here**.

In addition, the NHS' <u>'Is my child too ill for</u> <u>school'</u> website may be useful to signpost to families who have concerns about whether or not to send their child to school. With many parents citing the Covid-19 pandemic as a cause of increased anxiety around keeping their children safe and healthy in school, this official guidance from the NHS* may provide some 'black and white' facts.

You may find a joint <u>open letter from</u> <u>Professor Chris Whitty</u>* and his colleagues to school leaders a useful read, especially as we approach cold and flu season.

Free Eye Tests in Special Schools

Pupils enrolled in special schools will be eligible for a free NHS eye test from April 2024 under new government plans. It is expected that 165,000 children will be entitled to the test which will be supported with an optical voucher if glasses are required. Children with learning disabilities are 28 times more likely to experience sight problems according to charity SeeAbility*.

Child Poverty in Your Area

The group End Child Poverty* published its 2023 annual report in June, with headline figures showing that over 1 in 4 children across England live in poverty. We understand that schools in different areas will see childhood poverty present itself in different ways, with some being more challenged by it than others.



As you are planning for what measures you will implement this year to support members of your community who are experiencing poverty, you may find End Child Poverty's interactive tools useful or interesting. 
